# The Geopolitics of Higher Education

Scientific and academic diplomacy has long been a significant instrument of soft power in the hands of states, and therefore an important part of their foreign policy. This has been particularly true since the end of the Cold War, as the rise of globalization facilitated the circulation of capital, goods and people across the planet. During the next decades, universities deployed internationalization strategies that promoted study abroad programs, the transborder movement of scholars, and broad-based international research partnerships involving multiple institutions around the world. The underlying assumption behind the expansion of these exchanges was that global cooperation in research and education was both inherently and collectively beneficial.

This international environment began to change a few years ago with the emergence of new geopolitical tensions. First, illiberal trends developing in established democracies began to question the value of globalization, internationalization, and the principle of boundless academic collaboration. Second and even more significantly, the rise of China as a global power on a path to overtake the United States as the world's largest economy produced relations of competitive rivalry between the two countries, and later an atmosphere of enmity that extended to their respective allies. Russia's war against Ukraine has reinforced this trend towards a fragmentation of the global order, and the perception of a return to great-power competition.

This changing international landscape is having a profound impact on higher education around the world, regarding both student and faculty mobility, and transborder collaboration in research. To explore how the changing geopolitical order is affecting the higher education sector at global scale, the International Federation of Catholic Universities and the Commission of the Bishops' Conferences of the European Union are hosting this one-day event with the participation of experts, stakeholders and representatives of the European Commission.

## 10:15-11:15 - Panel 1: The changing landscape of internationalization in higher education

This panel will provide a broad overview of how internationalization in higher education has evolved over the past 7-8 years under the impact of new challenges, in particular the changing geopolitical landscape after decades of intensified student mobility, faculty exchanges and transnational scientific collaboration. It will also address the extent to which knowledge diplomacy has become a soft power weapon increasingly used by states to gain international visibility and status in an international order now vastly shaped by the strategic competition between the United States and China and the global divide produced by Russia's war against Ukraine. In addition, it will highlight the EU agenda for the promotion of cross-border scientific cooperation.

It will also examine the challenges interstate global competition poses for universities and research institutes, including the issue of brain drain/brain gain, and for technological advances, including the problems of technology transfer and of data security and privacy.
